


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President's Report

What a fabulous year for VPNG!

In October we held our Strategic Planning meeting and met face to face with the current VPNG Committee members, as well as 6 new Committee Members. Welcome to Jennifer Gamble, Mauricio Yanez, Sue Campigli, Naomi Mahon, Elyse Coffey and Eva Burton. The VPNG Committee continues to consist of a mix of regional and metropolitan Melbourne perioperative nurses, with members from as far West as Warrnambool and Stawell, to Echuca up North and Sale out East. This provides the Committee with valuable information about the perioperative educational requirements across Victoria.

At the meeting we reviewed the objectives from the previous 12 months and some of the VPNG Committee's very successful achievements were:

- an increase in VPNG membership in the last 12 months
- the production of four great editions of Snippets newsletter in the new online format
- the use of the online registration platform for all VPNG education events
- the introduction of VPNG rolling online membership fees
- a successful Country Conference in Echuca

Plans are well under way for 2019 with a number of VPNG education events already scheduled.





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BEING A STUDENT IN AN OPERATING THEATRE

Perioperative nurses throughout Victoria are in demand, and with an aging perioperative workforce we need to create a supportive learning environment for nursing students to encourage them to 'try' perioperative nursing during their graduate year. It is so important to be accommodating of students and try our best in such a high-pressure environment to give them a great experience as they are potentially the nurses of the future. It is often this experience that sways them to consider perioperative nursing.

A nursing student at Echuca Regional Hospital recently summarised her experience.

On my first day I was very nervous. I had no idea what a student would do in the perioperative unit on placement. My first thought was that the operating theatre didn't really sound anything like what I wanted to do, but I would give it a go and try my best.

First things first was to scrub up, which I thought made me look very professional. On my first day I spent a lot of time going through admissions, learning the process, and taking vital signs on admission. Gradually I was able to watch a few surgical procedures. The nurses continually said to me "Just leave at any time, do you feel

sick? Are you okay?" But I felt fine. I was very interested. I loved the rush in the room and watching everyone going about their job and getting it done. While watching the nurses count numerous instruments I thought would never be used during surgery. The surgeon washed his or her hands for what seemed like hours, and the patient being asked their name, date of birth over and over again, so much was going on.


Something I will never forget is on the last day the nurses and surgeons asked me if I wanted to scrub up and help with the procedure. I thought they were joking but they weren't. I washed my hands, thinking

that it was enough and then did it again. I kept thinking in my head repeatedly "Don't break the sterile field, don't break the sterile field". Helping and being involved was by far the best experience. The nurses and staff at Echuca were so friendly and patient, taking their time to explain processes to me and making me feel welcome.

Placement in operating theatre opened a door for me that I never would have considered by myself. Something I never would have pictured myself doing, and now it is something I am striving for when I graduate.



My placement in the operating theatre suite at Echuca Regional Health was such a great experience. I was given the opportunity to observe many different types of surgical procedures, including two caesarean sections. This a dream come true as I am interested in working in midwifery.


I had placement in the operating theatre for three weeks. Some may say it is a bit of an overkill and that I would not be able to practice the skills I have learnt at university; however, it was the complete opposite. On this placement I was given the opportunity to be involved in several different clinical activities that I had not completed on previous placements. These included priming an intravenous line and handing over a patient, which I was able to do on several occasions during my placement. I was also given the opportunity to scrub and assist the surgeon during a surgical procedure, as well as give patient medications, provide jaw support, remove an LMA and much more. I was given the opportunity to work in all areas of the operating suite and be involved in all the processes, from admitting a patient to discharging to the ward. As this was in real situations,

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where my skills were put to the test, and support and feedback was provided, my confidence has greatly increased, and I can see myself being part of a team like this in future. The type of work is very interesting, and I saw up close a different side of patient care where knowledge, speed, accuracy, precision and team work are vital during every step of the patient's journey.

All the staff in the operating theatre were extremely nice and gave me every opportunity to enhance my skills and knowledge. I felt so much more confident and comfortable due to the staff I was working with, who were very welcoming and knowledgeable.

This experience has encouraged me to further my education or steer my career direction towards perioperative nursing.

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SURGICAL MORTALITY: Who Is Listening?

Have you ever wondered what happens with the information detailed in an incident report and who reviews it once the incident has been closed? Have you thought about why the Nurse Unit Manager (NUM) and other managers insist on documenting all incidents? Well the good news is that incidents are reviewed at the local level (ward, hospital, Organisation) but also potentially escalated to the Department of Health; particularly where an incident has resulted in poor patient outcomes, including death, the process for investigation is very robust.

Following the commissioning of the Targeting Zero review of hospital safety and quality assurance in Victoria, the Victorian State Government established a number of new organisations to simplify the Health system, and better respond to the needs of patients and healthcare workers. Safer Care Victoria is one of these key organisations. This organisation works with patients, families and carers, clinicians and health services to monitor and improve the quality and safety of care across the public health system. The mission is simple: Outstanding healthcare for all Victorians. Always.

Safer Care Victoria is structured with 5 operational branches and 4 Chief Clinical Officers all working towards providing better outcomes and safer care for patients in Victoria.

Of these 5 operational branches, Stewardship and Support partners with the Victorian Agency for Health Information, to review data to track quality and safety improvements in the health system, identify issues and provide advice to the sector. In order to do this work effectively, this branch engages three ministerial appointed consultative councils that report on highly specialised areas of healthcare to help reduce mortality and morbidity. The councils:

- collect, analyse and report data relating to mortality and morbidity cases identify avoidable or contributing factors
- provide advice and recommendations to inform priority areas for research, quality and safety improvements and policy development.



These 6 consultative councils are;


- Consultative Council on Obstetric and Paediatric Mortality and Morbidity (CCOPMM)
- Victorian Consultative Council on Anaesthetic Mortality and Morbidity (VCCAMM)
- Victorian Clinical Council
- Safer Care Patient and Family Council
- Voluntary Assisted Dying Review Board
- Victorian Surgical Consultative Council (VSCC)

The VSCC, established in 2001, review causes of avoidable causes of mortality and morbidity associated with surgery and provide feedback to the medical profession on any systemic issues that is identified. Surgeons and clinicians are encouraged to report significant injuries that occur as a result of, or in association with, an operative procedure. The council reports publicly on the quality and safety of surgical services in Victoria, providing advice, recommendation and practical strategies to improve.

So, next time you are involved in a significant surgical incident resulting in a poor outcome, surgical death or morbidity incident, remember, the information you provide will assist all Victorians to receive better, safer care.






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Delegates report on the VPNG MANAGEMENT SEMINAR

On Saturday 3rd of November VPNG hosted a Management Seminar for Perioperative Nurse Unit Managers, Associate Nurse Unit Managers and Clinical Nurse Specialists. The event was fittingly held at Nurses Memorial Centre which celebrates and supports best practice in the nursing profession and honours nurses who have contributed to the Australian people. So instead of heading to Flemington (Derby Day), approximately 40 nurses attended the Management Seminar and were treated to some wonderful insights, practical tips and very honest experiences of what management and leadership can be.

Anna Hinz warmly welcomed all to the event and launched into the program with "Finance Basics: Numbers Don't Have to Be Boring!" discussing the importance of knowing your business and the importance of no surprises when reporting to your manager. Anna's take home messages were to understand demand and any change in the business, the importance of building a budget and understanding the budget that reflects as much as possible activity, labour and operational expenses – numbers are certainly not boring!

"What Managers Need to Know" was delivered by Anne Hardy, CSSD NUM at Knox Private Hospital. Anne's presentation delivered great insights into the importance of the management of CSSD. The impact of the updated AS/NZS: 4187, 2014 and the requirements of this standard has on us. Anne's passion and experience for risk management,

infection control, logistics, education and staff was admirable.


Mauricio Yandez shared with the group a very candid reflection on "How to Survive the First Year in Management" at Central Gippsland Health. Mauricio's take home message was

that managers are facilitators of people. With the clever use of an acrostic poem, Mauricio used the word facilitator and his first-hand experience to share what he had learnt from being a manager in a new hospital, new town and the impact of this on him, his family and his team.





Next up we were privy to the experiences gained by Rebecca Donald, Perioperative Services Manager at Box Hill in "Managing and Implementing Change" with the introduction of Electronic Medical Records and opening of a brand new operating suite. This presentation provided those present with more of an understanding of the challenges and how to deal with these when introducing major change.

For our next session Laura O'Connor was inspirational in her discussion about "Communication in Teams- Are you listening?" We were out of our comfy chairs, broken up into two large groups and solving a problem with no communication. We all achieved this of course with the take home message of the importance of communication. As managers and potential managers, the questions raised by Laura were around how to review our current communication with our teams and gave us plenty to think about. These included; How are we communicating – is the message being delivered, are we using technology to our advantage, are we asking how our staff want to receive communication, What communication is being delivered so that staff can be alert to the important information, When is communication being conveyed, What is being communicated and why, is it relevant to all, When are you communicating the information, is it timely? Laura inspired us to think outside the square, be innovative and use technology.

"Knowing what to do when the job you get isn't the one you ordered" was delivered by Anna Hinz who provided some very practical advice on what to ask at your next job interview to assist you in ensuring that you are getting what you are looking for.

Last session presented by Lauren Bell was on Clinical EFT; to be really honest I was thinking that this session was going to be about numbers. Wrong! This was a session to remind us of the need to take time out and use tools to care for ourselves. EFT stands for Emotional Freedom Technique (who doesn't want that?). Lauren introduced us into "tapping" and the feedback on the day was that we could feel ourselves relax following this experience. Lauren was passionate about balance and that as nurses we care for everyone else and not so much for ourselves.

In summary, the day was excellent with presenters sharing honest and heart-warming experiences of some of the difficult times as




Finally, we presented flowers to Dee who coordinated the event, in a fond farewell and recognition of her significant contributions to the VPNG Committee during her tenure.

- All applicants will be notified of the Conference Committee's decision in writing.






Introduction to Perioperative Nursing Course November 2018



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REPORT DECEMBER 2018

The ACORN board spent time in Perth as the next stop buttressing with the Local Associations (states), whilst hosting our Board Meetings. We were honoured to be invited to ACORN WA's 50th Annual Conference, where the diverse program displayed the talent and dedication of perioperative personnel in WA. Along with the educational commitment of ACORN WA, which is replicated across the different states. Participating in a Q & A session with the delegates also demonstrated that similar hurdles are faced in our profession nationwide, though their conference program touched on research initiatives such as multi-disciplinary communication which may begin to address some of the shared concerns.


The Q & A session also raised discussion of member benefits such as professional indemnity insurance discount (with Guild Insurance) and the grant available to assist perioperative nurses volunteering and teaching internationally. Many of the grants, awards and scholarship will open early 2019, so now is a great time to consider your plan for next year.

During ACORN WA's Conference we were also able to hold a General Meeting, passing an amendment to our Constitution to update official name changes from some states (Tasmania, Queensland and Western Australia) and also to appoint a Company Auditor. The minutes will become available on the ACORN website.

I recently attended the webinar during Perioperative Nurse's Week, where we had 5 minutes with nurses in different stages of their careers from around Australia. This provided an invigorating platform to see some of the different career options (such as manager, educator and nurse practitioner) and hear how people achieved their role. I look forward to the future webinars, particularly as the Research Committee are planning to deliver a few based around encouraging and bringing together research nurses from the budding to the experienced researcher. Keep your eye out for more details regarding these and other topics in 2019.

Along similar lines to the webinar, the Education Committee have been developing a resource for perioperative career pathways, which has been mentioned during the last couple of state visits. This will provide a fantastic resource and is one of the many initiatives the Board have been working on within each Committee. 


across Australia is part of what makes our journal such interesting reading.
